From Thunderbird, the focus moved

to Spruce Meadows and the final observations for our World Championship team hopefuls under the watch of Eric and the High Performance Advisory Group. On the last day of the 'National' tournament, Erynn Ballard, Mario Deslauriers, Tiffany Foster, Amy Millar, and Beth Underhill were officially named as the five-member squad that will travel to Herning, Denmark, in August to represent Canada. Let's wish them luck as they seek Olympic qualification for 2024 and, hopefully, come home with a medal or two from this prestigious event.

While we are seeing some exciting new horses in the making for the Canadian team, it was sad to learn that Eric is retiring Chacco Kid from competition following an injury the horse sustained at Spruce Meadows. While he was often in the shadow of his Olympic barn mate, Fine Lady 5, who was retired last year, 'Chacco' did his fair share of winning over the years. His huge heart and personality shone through in every performance, and we'll miss seeing this amazing horse in the show ring.

Finally, we hope you took part in the recent survey that the EC Jumping department sent out to all sport license holders regarding equitation rules and the soundness check for hunter competitions. Your input is very valuable to informing our committee as we prepare to make recommendations on these two important topics.

CANADIAN SHOW JUMPING TEAM FOURTH IN LONGINES NATIONS' CUP OF CANADA

The Canadian Show Jumping Team finished fourth in the \$400,000 Longines FEI Jumping Nations Cup™ of Canada held on Sunday, June 5, at Thunderbird Show Park in Langley, BC.

Last held in 2019 before the COVID-19 pandemic forced a two-year hiatus, this year's Nations' Cup of Canada attracted a starting field of six countries including Canada as the defending champions. A repeat win was not to be, however, as the Canadian team comprised of Mario Deslauriers, Tiffany Foster, Jacqueline Steffens Daly, and Beth Underhill trailed in fifth position with 24 faults at the end of the opening round. Only Israel suffered a worse fate when Daniel Bluman riding Ubiluc was eliminated at the open water jump, putting its three-man team out of contention for the second round. Ireland led with a score of four faults at the midway mark.

Under the guidance of chef d'equipe Eric Lamaze, the Canadian team dug deep to improve on its opening round performance. As the lead-off rider, Beth Underhill, 59, of Mulmur, ON, changed Canada's trajectory with a fault-free performance on her second tour of the grass field riding Chacco Kid, a 16-year-old Oldenburg gelding (Chacco Blue x Come On) owned by the Chacco Kid Group.

Deslauriers, 57, of New York, NY, repeated his first-round effort, delivering another four-fault performance with his Tokyo Olympic mount Bardolina 2, a 13-year-old Holsteiner mare (Clarimo x Landos) that he owns in partnership with Wishing Well Farm LLC.

Having made her Canadian Show Jumping Team debut in March in the Longines FEI Jumping Nations Cup™ of Mexico, Steffens Daly, 28, of Harriston, ON, was back for her second appearance riding for the maple leaf. After providing the drop score of 16 faults in the opening round, Steffens Daly had fence three down the second time out with Freaky, a 12-year-old Dutch Warmblood gelding (Darco x Litho X) that she owns in partnership with Team Eye Candy.

Hometown favourite Foster, 37, of Langley, BC, incurred 12 faults in the opening round before returning to her usual strong form to jump clear the second time out over the track set by Canadian course designer, Peter Holmes. The two-time Olympian was partnered with Hamilton, an 11-year-old Holsteiner gelding (Quadros 3 x Acolord) owned by The Hamilton Group.

With four faults to count from the second round, Canada moved up to finish fourth overall on a final score of 28 faults. Ireland claimed an easy victory with five faults followed by Mexico in second with 13 faults. Australia took third with 22 faults while the United States, hampered by the elimination of Karl Cook at the water jump in the

opening round and his subsequent withdrawal, took fifth with 36 faults.

“The lesson to be learned is that when we have a training camp, where people are riding together for a week or 10 days before the event, we come together as a team and we produce, as we saw in Europe,” said Lamaze, referencing Canada’s third and fifth place finishes respectively at CSIO5* La Baule, France, and CSIO5* Rome, Italy. “After the hype of La Baule and Rome, which was so intense with so much training, the approach we had coming here with such a quick turn around from Rome last week was not good. The result we got is the result we deserve. A disappointing day, yes, but we can’t plan to be great at La Baule and Rome without losing some focus on this event.”

Speaking to the performances of each of his riders, Lamaze said, “Mario was fantastic, he was there for everyone, did his job, and showed a lot of team spirit. Beth did her best on a horse we’ve been asking a lot of, and we wanted to see where Jacqueline was at. She came back and had four faults the second time which shows strong character, but we can’t have 16 faults the first time out. Tiffany wasn’t on her best horse but produced a clear in the second round. All the riders put in good rounds to finish, and to see riders come back and better their scores, that’s what counts.”

The Longines FEI Jumping Nations Cup™ of Canada acted as the second and final qualifier for the North and Central America and Caribbean League which sees the top two teams following qualifying events head to the Longines FEI Jumping Nations Cup™ Final in Barcelona, Spain, from September 29 to October 2, 2022. Mexico and Canada were confirmed as the two countries to book their tickets to the annual Spanish fixture.

WOMEN OF CANADIAN SHOW JUMPING ON TOP

Two female Canadian show jumping competitors have been enjoying time in the international spotlight. Erynn Ballard opened the 2022 season as the top-ranked female in the Longines FEI World Rankings in 29th position. The world rankings take into account all results earned in FEI-sanctioned competition for the past 12 months. Ballard of Tottenham, ON, held onto the top position in January, rising to 28th in the standings before being dislodged in February by Tokyo Olympic team gold medalist Malin Baryard-Johnsson of Sweden.

However, when the rankings were calculated at the end of May, it was another Canadian who emerged as the top-ranked female in the world. Tiffany Foster of Langley, BC, surpassed Baryard-Johnsson with a ranking of 33rd while the Swedish rider fell to 34th position. Of the top 10 Canadians in the current World Rankings, seven are female.

MEET THE NATIONAL TEAM PROGRAM ATHLETES

TIFFANY FOSTER | LANGLEY, BRITISH COLUMBIA

No one's name appears more often on the 2022 National Team Program list than Tiffany Foster's. Meeting the qualifying criteria with no fewer than four mounts, the accomplishment speaks volumes to the strength and depth of Foster's current string of international mounts. Even better, a diversity in owners is represented, ensuring a strong foundation from which the 37-year-old can continue to build.

That diversity also means ensuring that her training business, Little Creek Equestrian, and its students have access to the top horse shows around the world. With bases already established in Wellington, FL, and Vrasene, Belgium, Foster's client and friend, Wendy Valdes, is currently developing a new outpost for the Little Creek team back where it all began in Langley, BC.

We caught up with Foster during the Spruce Meadows 'National' tournament – where she was officially named to the Canadian Show Jumping Team for the upcoming World Championships in Herning, Denmark – to learn more about this talented and driven athlete's background.

What age did you start riding and what was the name of your first pony or horse?

I started taking lessons at North Shore Equestrian Center in North Vancouver, BC, when I was eight years old. When I was 11, my parents bought one of the school ponies for me and my sister, Rebecca, to share. Her name was My Lucky Shamrock, "Shamrock" for short, and she was the best pony!

You are currently named to the National Team Program 'A' Squad with Northern Light and to the 'B' Squad with Brighton, Figor, and Hamilton. How long have you been partnered with each horse, and what are your goals with each for this season?

I have had Northern Light, who we call "Nora," since 2019. She sustained a minor injury in Florida this winter, so she has been coming back from that. I took her as a second horse on the European Spring Tour and she was very good there so my goal with her is to continue in the big classes and hopefully do some grand prix classes.

I have had Brighton since 2013. He's getting a little older now, so I aim him for one class a week and try to win it. He's such a great competitor! I try to keep him happy, and I hope I can keep him going for a few more years.

I have had Figor since 2018 and he has really stepped up as my lead horse. He's become very reliable and a lot of fun to ride because I'm never worried about how big the jumps are; he can jump anything! My goal for him this year is the World Championships and then to try for the big Grand Prix at the Spruce Meadows 'Masters' in Calgary in September.

I started riding Hamilton in 2019 and put together a syndicate to buy him in 2020. He was a little behind on experience when I got him, but he has developed very well and is now a strong member of my team. He loves Spruce Meadows, so my goal is to jump him in the Queen Elizabeth II Cup during the 'North American' tournament in July and to do him in a five-star grand prix in Europe this summer.

What is your favourite competition memory?

There are so many! A big one was winning team gold in Toronto at the 2015 Pan American Games. We really had to fight back in the second round to win. Our team was so incredible that day. I'll always remember it.

Favourite horse show venue to compete at?

My favourite places to compete are Spruce Meadows, Aachen, Windsor, and Thunderbird. I can't choose just one!

Which competition is still on your bucket list?

I've never done Hickstead before and I would like to one day.

Dream vacation?

On a mountain in the forest with my dog, Bichu.

Cats or Dogs?

Dog! See answer above.

Last show you binge-watched?

The Last Kingdom on Netflix. I'm obsessed.

Favourite motto or saying?

Perseverendo. It's our family motto on my mom's side. It's Latin and means to persevere.

What three things are always in your fridge?

Oatly Barista Blend oat milk, lemon Spindrift sparkling water, and pickles.

If you could ride any horse in the world, past or present, which one would you pick?

All of mine! If I'm not allowed to pick my own, then I would go with Ben Maher's Explosion W.

What's one thing most people don't know about you?

I used to be terrified of horses and riding when I first started. I only stopped being scared when I met Shamrock; she taught me to trust horses and the rest is history!

ERIC LAMAZE'S CHACCO KID RETIRED FROM COMPETITION

Eric Lamaze has announced the retirement of Chacco Kid from competition. The 16-year-old chestnut Oldenburg gelding (Chacco Blue x Come On) sustained an injury while competing in the 1.50m ATB Cup on Sunday, June 21, at the Spruce Meadows 'National' tournament in Calgary, AB.

“Chacco’ was landing and turning from the double Rolex vertical when one of his hind feet clipped the front foot,” explained Lamaze. “Normally, the front shoe would come off but in this case it didn’t. He tried to step out of it, resulting in an injury to his check ligament. At 16 years old, it’s too much to expect him to come back and jump again. Instead, we’re looking forward to giving him a nice retirement in the field in Belgium where we can see him every day and enjoy reliving many memories.”

Lamaze discovered Chacco Kid through Marcel Delestre, who was training the Colombian show jumping team at the time. Chacco Kid was imported from Colombia and joined Lamaze’s string in the winter of 2016. The pair began showing at that year’s Winter Equestrian Festival in Wellington, FL.

Partnered with Chacco Kid, Lamaze enjoyed numerous victories around the globe and represented Canada at the 2018 World

Equestrian Games in Tryon, NC. For Lamaze, his most meaningful win with Chacco Kid came in the \$500,000 RBC Grand Prix of Canada, presented by Rolex, during the 2019 Spruce Meadows 'National' tournament in Calgary, AB. It was Lamaze's first competition since publicly revealing that he had been battling a brain tumour.

"My favourite memory with Chacco was winning the RBC Grand Prix when I wasn't well," recalled Lamaze. "The win was 70 percent horse and 30 percent rider. He knew he had to take care of me and seemed to rise to the occasion."

In addition to Lamaze, several riders for his Torrey Pines Stable also campaigned the horse with impressive results including Kara Chad and Beth Underhill of Canada and Nina Mallevaey of France.

"Having success with four different riders over the course of his career is exceptional," said Lamaze. "His personality, his heart, and his carefulness allowed him to maneuver some of the biggest courses in the world."

Chacco Kid is owned by the Chacco Kid Group, consisting of Rick and Sara Mershad, Ludi and Carol Sollak, and Andy and Carlene Ziegler.

"It's sad to see a horse that has done so much for so many riders leave the sport this way," concluded Lamaze. "I'm very sorry for Carlene and Andy, Carol and Ludi, and Sara and Rick for this sad ending. It's the sport and we have to live with it, just like athletes have career-ending injuries in hockey and basketball and other sports. There are accidents that, even with the best care, we cannot prevent. On days like these, we should remember and celebrate this extraordinary horse and all that he accomplished."

BETH UNDERHILL JOINS ROME GLADIATORS FOR GLOBAL CHAMPIONS LEAGUE

The Rome Gladiators have added Canadian Olympian Beth Underhill to its team for the second half of the 2022 Global Champions League season.

The mid-season transfer sees Underhill join Shane Breen of Ireland; Under 25 rider Zoe Conter of Belgium; French rider Edward Levy; Under 25 rider Nina Mallevaey of France; and Fernando Martinez Sommer of Mexico in representing the Rome Gladiators, powered by ClipMyHorse.TV. Underhill replaces Pieter Clemens of Belgium.

Organized alongside the Longines Global Champions Tour, the Global Champions League team competition is comprised of 16 events around the world including the team's home stop in Rome, Italy, from September 1 to 4, 2022. The Rome Gladiators were on the podium with third place finishes in Miami, United States, and Stockholm, Sweden. Following the first eight events of the season, the Rome Gladiators currently sit eighth in the overall rankings among 16 teams.

"We're incredibly excited to have Beth joining the team," said Tara Dow-Rein on behalf of the Rome Gladiators team owner, Rein Family LLC. "It was our intention to have our best horses on the team. We've recently invested in more horsepower for Nina and now Beth will also compete with our horses."

"We've been so pleased with the performances of our team members to date and are now looking forward to seeing what they can do in the second-half of the season with the addition of Beth," continued Dow-Rein.

"I am honoured to be part of the Global Champions League at the invitation of Tara and Mark Rein," said Underhill of competing for the Canadian owners. "It's a fantastic team that has some great riders and has been getting strong results. I'm really excited for this new venture."

Underhill becomes only the second Canadian, and the first Canadian female athlete, to compete in the Global Champions League after Eric Lamaze, who rode for various teams over several seasons before announcing his retirement from the sport earlier this year. In addition to operating her own training business, Beth Underhill Stables, Underhill also rides for Lamaze's Torrey Pines Stable.

JUMP CANADA HALL OF FAME FLASHBACK

Four new inductees were celebrated at the 11th edition of the Jump Canada Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony and Gala, presented by BMO Financial Group, held Sunday, November 4, 2018, at the Liberty Grand in Toronto, ON. As always, the black-tie evening evoked wonderful memories of hunter and jumper sport from a past era. Having profiled Big Secret (Hunter Horse) and Lucille “Lou” Carpenter (Builder – Individual) in our last two issues respectively, we now look at the accomplishments of Robert Jolicoeur. Inducted in the category of Official, Jolicoeur has enjoyed a long and storied career in the equestrian industry that extends far beyond the role of course designer.

Official: Robert Jolicoeur

Every course designer dreams of one day seeing their vision come to life at the Olympic Games. For Robert Jolicoeur, that dream not only came true; it kickstarted his career.

As young professionals, Robert and his brother, Pierre Jolicoeur, operated their training stable, Robespierre Stable, west of Montreal in St. Lazare, QC. As a hunter/jumper rider competing locally, Robert got his start by telling show organizers how poor their courses were. When organizers invited him to “put his money where his mouth was,” Robert did just that, and began designing both show jumping and eventing courses. When the 1976 Olympic Games came to town, a young Robert was appointed assistant course designer to Tom Gayford. The accolade would become a turning point in his career and set him on his life path.

Inspired by the landscape architect responsible for decorating the show rings at the 1976 Olympic Games, Robert returned to school at the age of 28 and spent four years earning his degree in landscape architecture from the University of Montreal. Upon graduating, he founded his company, International Equestrian Design, in 1981 and quickly accelerated from designing city parks to specializing in the building and design of equestrian facilities ranging from commercial racetracks to Olympic stadiums.

When the Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI) introduced a licensing system for officials, Robert became the first course designer in Canada to hold his ‘O’ license, denoting his ability to work at the Olympic level. He set the tracks at some of the biggest events in the world, including Toronto’s Royal Agricultural Winter Fair and the National Horse Show at Madison Square Garden in New York City, NY. He also acted as FEI Technical Delegate at three editions of World Cup Final and at over 80 World Cup qualifying events. He excelled at designing jumping derby courses, as his early years designing cross-country courses, including steeplechase tracks, had provided him with great experience working with natural obstacles.

His empathy as a horseman, skill as a course designer, and education as a landscape architect combined to give Robert a unique view on equestrian venue planning and construction. With a vision that expanded far beyond the show ring, Robert was soon in demand as a facility builder for racing, competition, and private venues. Renowned for keeping the safety and comfort of the horse at the forefront of his plans, Robert’s designs are both functional and attractive. He is widely considered to be the first footing expert in North America, and always took drainage and appropriate materials into consideration in his ring designs.

At the 1976 Montreal Olympics, Robert designed the show jumping courses. Twenty years later at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta, Robert designed the entire facility. In Canada, Robert was responsible for the grass grand prix fields at Thunderbird Show Park in Langley, BC, and Wesley Clover Parks in Ottawa, ON, both of which continue to host FEI-sanctioned competition to this day.

South of the border, he designed such well-known venues as the Palm Beach Polo Equestrian Club (formerly part of the Palm Beach Polo & Country Club before becoming the Equestrian Village) in Wellington, FL, where competitors continue to enjoy jumping on the grass field, as well as The Oaks Blenheim Riding Park in San Juan Capistrano, CA. All told, Robert estimates that he has built over 1,000 rings during his career for a client list that reads like the who’s who of horse sport.

A true innovator in his field, Robert Jolicoeur has literally designed and built a legacy in hunter/jumper sport.

CANADIAN TEAM NAMED FOR 2022 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Erynn Ballard of Tottenham, ON; Mario Deslauriers of New York, NY; Tiffany Foster of Langley, BC; Amy Millar of Perth, ON; and Beth Underhill of Mulmur, ON, have been named to the Canadian Show Jumping Team for the World Championships scheduled for August 8 to 14, 2022, in Herning, Denmark.

Ballard has been named to the team with Gakhir, an 11-year-old chestnut Dutch Warmblood gelding (Spartacus TN x VDL Indorado) owned by Ilan Ferder and Esperanza Imports LLC. Foster will ride Figor, a 12-year-old bay Dutch Warmblood gelding (Querly-Elvis x Indoctro) owned by Artisan Farms LLC and Foster. Millar has been named to the team with Truman, a 13-year-old bay Selle Français gelding (Mylord Carthago x Kolibri) owned by Millar Brooke Farm Ltd. and Overlund. Underhill's partner will be Nikka van den Bisschop, a nine-year-old bay Belgian Warmblood mare (Emerald x Nabab de Reve) owned by Rein Family LLC and Torrey Pines Stable Inc.

Deslauriers will serve as the traveling alternate with Bardolina 2, a 13-year-old bay Holsteiner mare (Clarimo x Landos) owned by Deslauriers and Wishing Well Farm LLC.

Eric Lamaze, who has represented Canada at the last seven consecutive World Championships, will act as chef d'équipe for the first time at a major games. He will be supported by James Hood, Director, High Performance; Karen Hendry-Ouellette, Manager of Sport – Jumping; and Dr. Eduardo Felix, Team Veterinarian.

The schedule of events for show jumping is as follows:

- Monday, August 8 – Horse Inspection
- Wednesday, August 10 – Individual Competition – Speed
- Thursday, August 11 – Team and Individual Competition – Round 1
- Friday, August 12 – Team and Individual Competition – Round 2 (Team Final)
- Sunday, August 14 – Individual Final

2023 PAN AM ORGANIZING COMMITTEE CONFIRMS VENUES

The organizing committee of the 2023 Pan American Games to be held in Santiago, Chile, has confirmed the venues for all 75 sports. The equestrian events of Jumping, Dressage, and Eventing will be held at the San Isidro Riding School located in Quillota, approximately a two-hour drive north-west of Santiago.

The Pan Am Games are scheduled to take place from October 20 to November 5, 2023. Should the Canadian Show Jumping Team fail to qualify for the 2024 Paris Olympic Games at the upcoming World Championships in Herning, Denmark, it can qualify at the Pan Am Games by finishing as one of the top two nations not already qualified.

CANADA TAKES SECOND IN JUNIOR NATIONS' CUP

The Canadian team comprised of Stella Chernoff, Brooklyn Deacon, Eric Krawitt, and Ava Wong finished second in the CSIOJ Nations' Cup held on Saturday, June 4, at Thunderbird Show Park in Langley, BC.

Open to athletes aged 14 to 18, Canada faced off against teams from Mexico and the United States. As Canada's lead-off rider, Chernoff of DeWinton, AB, produced double clear rounds riding Fay, a 12-year-old Dutch Warmblood mare (Willow x Silverstone) owned by Stump Lake Ranch & Cattle Co.

Wong of Calgary, AB, produced scores of four and four riding Dammam. O.L., a 14-year-old Dutch Warmblood gelding (Cardento x Arkansas) owned by Highland Farms. She was followed in the order by Deacon of Abbotsford, BC, who provided the drop score in the opening round before being eliminated at the water the second time out with Decimus, an eight-year-old American Holsteiner gelding (Diarado x Riverman).

Riding as the team anchor, Krawitt of Okotoks, AB, produced a clear first round with Chicago CM, his newly acquired nine-year-old Holsteiner gelding (Cassini I x Carpaccio). Coming back for round two, Krawitt had to maintain a clear score sheet to stay ahead of Mexico, who were sitting on nine faults compared to Canada's eight. When a rail fell at fence five, Mexico celebrated victory while Canada settled for second with a total of 12 faults. The United States took third with 16 faults.

"Stella being the lead-off rider and jumping double clean is a very good achievement," said Dayton Gorsline, who acted as Chef d'Equipe for the Canadian Junior team. "I sent her first because she is so quick and consistent in her riding. I thought she rode exceptionally well.

"We were a little unlucky that our last horse had four faults because he could have easily jumped clean," continued Gorsline. "I thought the kids represented themselves and Canada very well. This is a building block for the North American Youth Championships and for kids going forward, and I think we identified some good young talent here. They will all learn from this experience. It's safe to say that the future looks bright."

WORLD CUP FINAL AWARDED TO TEXAS

The United States has played host to the FEI Jumping World Cup™ Final on several occasions, but never in Texas. That will change in 2026 when the Lone Star State welcomes the world to Fort Worth for both the dressage and show jumping World Cup Finals.

The International Equestrian Federation (FEI) awarded the two Finals to Fort Worth during its in-person meeting held at FEI Headquarters in Switzerland on June 21 and 22, 2022. The 2026 World Cup Finals will be organized by Split Rock Jumping Tour (SRJT), whose first event in Texas, the CS14*-W Fort Worth International, was held in December of 2021.

"It has long been a dream of mine to organize a championship and I really could not be more excited," said SRJT Founder and President Derek Braun. "This is a testament to what the Split Rock team has accomplished over the last seven years and to the city of Fort Worth and the incredible event they helped us put on last December."

Since its inaugural event in 1979, the annual FEI Jumping World Cup™ Final has been held in the United States in Baltimore (1980), Tampa (1989), Del Mar (1992), Las Vegas (2000, 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009, 2015) and Omaha (2017 and scheduled for 2023). Canada's Ian Millar made history at the 1989 edition in Tampa, FL, when he became the first athlete to win back-to-back titles riding the great Big Ben.

Nicole Walker of Aurora, ON, topped a 45-horse starting field riding Atout des Trambles to win the \$15,000 1.30m Trimac Cup in the two-star division on the final day of the 'National' tournament.



Eric Krawitt, 17, of Okotoks, AB, scored the first five-star win of his young career by outpacing Mario Deslauriers in the jump-off for the \$137,700 1.50m ATB Cup riding Cactus de Cosniere.

IMPORTANT NOTICE: AMENDMENT TO EC RULES

The following sections of the Equestrian Canada (EC) Rules have been amended through the Extraordinary Rule Amendment (ERA) process, effective immediately:

- Section A: General Regulations
- Section G: Hunter, Jumper, Equitation and Hack

Noteworthy updates and changes are outlined below.

SECTION A: GENERAL REGULATIONS

Several rule changes have been implemented in the General Regulations to support the use of National Rankings.

Under Article A805, a clarification has been made that a competition may refuse entries for a class that is restricted based on selection from the National Rankings. Also, restricted classes that are limited primarily based on selection from National Rankings will accumulate points toward EC awards. For example, this includes classes limited by both selection from National Rankings and by geographic region. With the use of National Rankings, the entry qualification requirement to have won a certain number of ribbons has been removed, as has imposed class entry limits set by competitions.

Under Articles A1501, A1503 and A1504, a clarification has been made that points can be accumulated toward National Rankings when competing at EC sanctioned competitions across Canada. National Rankings do not attribute points to provinces.

Under Article A1502, the requirement to have competed and placed in a minimum number of EC sanctioned competitions in order to be eligible for EC awards has been removed.

Under Article A1504, a clarification has been made on where points will be credited for combined divisions, as well as when points will and will not be accumulated toward National Rankings for combined classes.

SECTION G: HUNTER, JUMPER, EQUITATION AND HACK

Several rule changes have been implemented in the Hunter, Jumper, Equitation and Hack rules to support the use of National Rankings.

Under Article G107, a clarification has been made that points will not be accumulated toward National Rankings for any owner and/or rider whose horse competes in a class for which the horse is not eligible. Another clarification has been made that a provincial hunter/jumper association membership is not required to accumulate points toward National Rankings. For provincial hunter/jumper points and awards, refer to your provincial organization.

Under Article G113, a clarification has been made that restricted classes that are limited primarily based on selection from National Rankings will accumulate points toward EC awards. For example, this includes classes limited by both selection from National Rankings and by geographic region.

Under Article G315, a clarification has been made that for hunter classics in which National Ranking listed classes and miscellaneous non-point classes are combined, points do not count toward National Rankings.

Under Article G316, a clarification has been made that as hunter derbies are currently miscellaneous non-point classes, points will not count toward National Rankings. Hunter derbies can be offered under the open guidelines described in Article G316. There are currently no rules or class specifications to provide a qualification standard across Canada.

Regarding Jump Cup Requirements under Article G116, the requirement of FEI approved keyhole breakaway track systems “on the back rails of oxers, middle and back rails of triple bars, and rails over water” has been re-inserted after unintentional removal in the 2022 rule change process. To align with FEI Jumping Rules, “all” rails over water must use FEI approved keyhole breakaway track systems.
